A) An old sea Shanty covered by a Scottish postman hits the global charts

Hi everyone!

D) The Rebirth of Shanty

"I 've never thought this song would storm the whole world" – a quote from the `Wellerman song'-performer Nathan Evans. But what is the reason for this song's sudden success?

For weeks, even months, this song has been thrilling listeners whether old or young on all streaming platforms and on the radio.

The fact that you learn something about the hard work of whale hunting at sea hardly made the song a viral hit... But there is a clear link between the isolation of young people being whalers in the 19th century and that (of young people) due to the COVID pandemic.

For a year now the world has only known one topic of conversation.

For a year now, we've been living in a pandemic.

For a year now, people around the world have been dying every day due to the corona virus which severely restricts our freedom.

The song thus reflects the hope that the time of confinement due to the global pandemic may soon be over. The sailors back then must also have experienced and felt such a pressure out there, on the rough merciless sea.

When does it finally stop? When will the sad, scary spook eventually end?

The melody, which addresses both young and old, has something tremendously comforting, which encourages the audience to feel a kind of "cohesion" - even in this crisis.

Almost forgotten, a shanty (i. e. an actually very old music genre) is now taking part in the German charts.

Another parallel can be found, when one considers that England has left the EU partly because of free fishing rights - hoping they will then be able to catch much more fish than they are allowed under EU law today.

However, the song must also be viewed critically, as it deals with the topic of brutal whaling, which especially in Japan increases again at the moment. Countries like Japan, Iceland, Norway, but in a figurative sense the English, too, tend to disregard this critical view – because they are no longer in the EU.

With regard to the current Brexit topic, the sailors could stand for the Scottish who are waiting for the `wellerman' to arrive. The `wellerman' could then be interpreted as Europe since many Scots want to belong to the EU again. The captain, who stands for England, however wants to continue to catch whales and must therefore be independent of the EU...

All in all, the success of the song is justified because it is a community song from sailors. That means that people who like the song, who listen to it, congregate like the sailors did several hundred years ago and draw positive energy and hope from it.

E) The Wellerman parabola

2021 and everyone knows the lyrics of the old Scottish traditional song "Wellerman".

But why? And: What even is a "Wellerman"?

They are supply ships, named after their owners, the Weller brothers. These ships brought goods for the whalers working on the coasts, who were often rewarded with tea, sugar or rum instead of money. Not a very modern topic, isn't it? Unless you are not a fisherman that can relate with the situation on a ship, the song seems rather irrelevant.

However, suddenly, 150 years later, "Wellerman" is popular like never before. And that's because of the social media platform Tik Tok. F) Sea Shanty as spiritual fuel

In some way this sea shanty was able to bring us all together, which is probably its appeal and seemed to be just the perfect song we needed in order to connect us again and to bring us hope in the darkest of times.

The song itself leaves considerable room for interpretation and can be perceived in different ways. Who else wants to leave right now and has been insisting on doing so for the past 5 years? The UK of course! At first glance, many may not see a connection to Brexit, but there are definitely some parallels. Like the "the winds blowing up" referring to the heated negotiations and arguments about the UK's parting and the verse "one day, when the toungin' is done, we'll take our leave and go" implying that when they finally come to an arrangement and formulate a contract, they'll leave the EU. The captain would be the Prime Minister leading the whole operation and later his struggles are further explained, where he can't decide to stay or go and he's torn between Britain and the EU. At the end the song explains how the fight is still not over which is a clear reference to the differences still going on between the two sides and that their problems will continue existing.

Nevertheless we can all agree that no matter how you understand the song, it's a great one to say the least that deserved its hype and seeing another older song being remade and going viral in the future would certainly not surprise any of us anymore.
